tell us where to go next.**

We will either be sitting in the orchestra or mezzanine level.



These are the entrances to each level.

Our tickets will tell us exactly where to sit. We do not get to choose our seats.

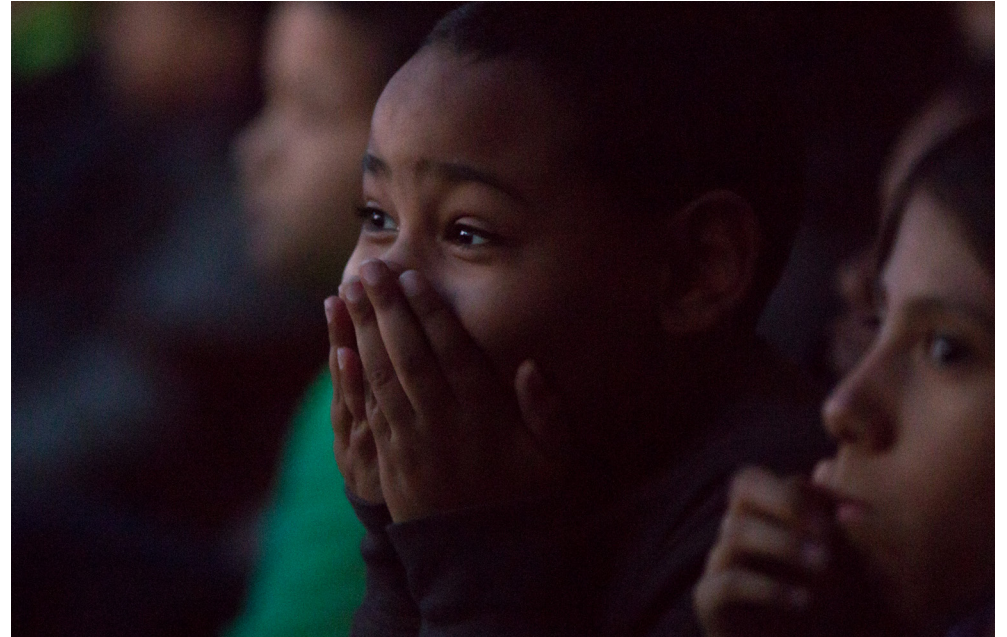
When it is time for the show to start, the theater will get darker (but the lights won't go off all the way) and everyone will get quiet.



I will try to remember that even if parts of the show get a little loud, or the makeup and costumes look strange or scary, none of this can hurt me or anyone else at the show.



Some parts of the show might be very funny and silly, and they will probably make me laugh.



Some parts of the show might make me nervous, but all of the actors and performers are EXPERTS, and have practiced a lot so that they will not get hurt.

If I get nervous or feel scared, I can:

Cover or close my eyes.



Talk to my grown-up.



Cover my ears with my hands or put on headphones.



Use a fidget tool.

If I need a break during the show, I can ask the grown-ups that I am with if they can take me.



There are open spaces in the hallways or in the lobby area where we can go for a walk or sit in a quiet corner.

We can also ask any of the theater staff if we need help finding something - like the gift shop or bathroom.

At the end of the show, all of the actors will come out on stage. This is called a CURTAIN CALL.



Many people will clap and cheer so the performers know how much they liked the show! When people really like a show, sometimes they stand up and cheer during the curtain call.

After the show is finished I will leave the theater with my family.



Sometimes we may have to wait a little while before we can leave the theater, because it can get very crowded when everyone is leaving at the same time.

**Hold one of my
grown-ups' hands**



**Talk to my family
or friends**



Use a fidget tool
