Acoustic Guitar



a stringed instrument with a flat body, a long neck with frets, and strings that are played with the fingers or with a pick

Cajón



a box-shaped percussion instrument played by slapping the front or back faces with the hands, fingers, brushes, mallets or sticks

Clarinet



a tube shaped woodwind instrument with intricate keys, a single-reed mouthpiece, and a flared, bell-shaped end played by blowing through the mouthpiece and moving the keys

Donkey Jaw



a percussion instrument made from the jawbone of a donkey played by striking the teeth with a hand or stick

Drum



a percussion instrument consisting of a hollow cylinder with a thin layer of material stretched over one or both ends played with the hands or a stick

Electric Guitar



a stringed instrument with a flat body, a long neck with frets, and strings that are played with the fingers or with a pick and magnified electrically

Guitarron



a large acoustic bass guitar played with the fingers

Jarana



a guitar-like stringed instrument

Percussion



a percussive instrument such as a gong, bell, cymbal, rattle and tambourine

Saxophone



a curved woodwind instrument with a single-reed mouthpiece and finger keys played by blowing through the mouthpiece and moving the keys

Trumpet




a tube shaped brass instrument ending in a flared bell and played by blowing through the mouthpiece and making a buzzing sound

Violin



a stringed instrument with a shallow body, a fingerboard without frets played with a bow **Música** includes a collection of songs highlighting Sonia De Los Santos' Mexican heritage and her family's journey to New York.
