TITLE: *The Princess and the Pea*

RUN TIME: 60 minutes

There is no intermission during *The Princess and the Pea*.

However, if you need to take a break, you can leave the theater and return.

There may be times when you have to wait a few minutes to return to the theater because it is safer for the performers. The ushers will let you know when you can re-enter.

Following *The Princess and the Pea* there will be a Talk-Back.

During a Talk-Back, a few actors will answer 2 – 4 questions from the audience.

ART FORMS: Physical theater, clowning, acrobatics


ONE SENTENCE SUMMARY: A pampered princess learns a lesson in humility—with the help of one pesky pea!

The Princess and the Pea is a nonverbal physical theater piece. Only two words are spoken throughout the show: “princess” and “pea.”

The story, an adaptation of the Hans Christian Andersen’s classic tale, is told through movement, acrobatics, slapstick comedy and sound effects.

In a lavish palace lives a pampered Princess who has everything her heart desires. Each day, three loyal servants—Green Servant, Yellow Servant and Blue Servant—attend to her every wish.

The play begins with the three Servants eating dinner... peas! The Green Servant's pea is unchewable and they throw it into the bowl of the Blue Servant.

The Blue Servant's pea is unchewable and they throw it into the bowl of the Yellow Servant.

The Yellow Servant's pea is also unchewable and they throw it far into the distance.



The Princess enters and is greeted with fanfare and platters of delicious food. Suddenly, her meal becomes inedible because a... pea has appeared in her mouth! Dinner is taken away.



The Green Servant, Yellow Servant and Blue Servant help the Princess get ready for sleep. As they carry her to a stack of fluffy mattresses, they avoid several peas. The Servants sing the Princess to sleep. After she drifts off to sleep, the Servants lay down on their thin mattresses on the ground.



The Princess begins to toss and turn. She cannot sleep! Under all of those mattresses, there's a... pea! The Princess kicks the pea far into the distance and goes to sleep.

In the morning, the Servants wake the Princess, dress her and help her mount her horse for a ride.

While riding, the Princess encounters a terrible storm and is thrown from her horse.

The Servants tidy the palace as they await the return of the Princess. They hear a knock at the door and, upon opening it, see a crying girl covered in mud. It's the Princess! But the Servants don't recognize her.



The Princess pushes her way into the palace. She tries to sit on her throne, have a bite of food, take a sip of lemonade, climb into her big bed—but the Servants stop her at every turn.



Finally it's time for bed. The Servants put a mattress on the floor for the Princess and promptly fall asleep. But the Princess can't sleep! So she climbs into her big bed. She still can't sleep!

The Princess takes each of the Servants mattresses and adds it to her big bed. She still can't sleep!



The Servants wake on the floor and see the Princess struggling with the pile of mattresses. Acrobatics ensue until the pile comes tumbling down. At the base of the mattresses is a... pea!



After this reappearance of the pea, the Servants finally recognize their Princess. They all start making their way back to their beds, with the Princess on the big bed and the Servants on the floor.

But instead of the Princess keeping all the mattresses for herself stacked into the big bed, she redistributes the stack so everyone gets equal bedding. They all fall happily asleep.


