Leaping from the pages of the celebrated series of picture books, Grug, with the help of his friends Cara the carpet snake and Snoot the echidna, sets off on a quest to capture a rainbow that he can call his very own. Featuring playful puppetry and imaginative storytelling, Grug and his mates bound onto the stage and into a host of hilarious situations.

### FUN FACTS

Did you know that Australia is the world's largest island, but the smallest of all the continents? Like the U.S., Australia is made up of different states—six of them, in fact—and has approximately the same amount of landmass as the entire continental U.S.!



Adelaide, where GRUG AND THE RAINBOW was developed, is the capital city of South Australia, which has a varied landscape made up of dry land called the Outback, green farmland, rolling hills and sandy beaches.

Grug began his life as the top of a Burrawang tree, which is a type of tree native to Australia! The name burrawang is derived from the Dharuk language, now extinct, spoken by the aboriginal tribes indigenous to the Sydney and Illawarra regions of Australia.

### A Closer look:

Windmill Theatre Co. (Pinocchio, New Vic 2015; Grug, New Vic 2013; Plop!, New Vic 2012; Twinkle Twinkle Little Fish, New Vic 2003), located in Adelaide, Australia, was formed in 2002 as an initiative of the South Australian Government to provide high-quality performance experiences to inspire and enrich the cultural life, learning and imagination of children and families. Since their inception they have presented 56 productions in 10 countries and performed for a total of 500,000 children and families.

Ted Prior, author of the Grug book series, first came up with the character when he was living with his family on a farm. He decided to invent an imaginary bush animal made from a burrawang tree to entertain his two small children. GRUG AND THE RAINBOW is just one of over 25 books in the series!

This new production, directed by Sam Haren, features exquisite puppetry, magical set design by Jonathon Oxlade and gentle storytelling.





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# INSIDE / THE ART FORM

### PUPPETRY

A puppet is an inanimate figure representing a living character that is manipulated and brought to life by a puppeteer through the use of hands, rods, wires and/or other means. Examples of puppetry can be seen in the *Muppets, Sesame Street* and the Broadway production of *The Lion King*. There are many kinds of puppets such as marionettes, hand puppets, rod puppets and shadow puppets. GRUG AND THE RAINBOW features rod puppets manipulated by three storytellers, who also voice all of the characters!

### SET DESIGN

The set of a theatrical production is the physical environment in which the story takes place. The imaginative and innovative set in Windmill's GRUG AND THE RAINBOW allows the audience to see above and below ground, where Grug builds his home. Parts of the set open up to reveal surprises or are transformed into new landscapes. The dynamic set helps the company tell the story and bring all of the locations to life with wonder and delight!

### WHAT DO YOUR STUDENTS KNOW NOW?

Prior to exploring GRUG AND THE RAINBOW with your students, find out how much they already know about **THEATER**, **PUPPETRY** and **ADVENTURE**.

Have you ever been to the theater before? What did you see?

How can a storybook be brought to life on stage?

What is a puppet? How can puppets be used to tell a story?

What is a "set" in a play? How does it help tell a story?

Have you ever been on an adventure? Where did you go? What did you do?

### PAGE-TO-STAGE

Page-to-stage theater is a technique often used to bring literature, like children's books, to life. Artists work to capture the tone and spirit of the underlying material with respect for the original intent of the author. Through a collaborative design process, they incorporate many aspects of theatrical production, including character development, technical elements and storytelling to effectively connect with audiences. The show's creative team was inspired by Ted Prior's book series, following the adventures of Grug and his friends. Windmill's production of GRUG AND THE RAINBOW builds on the book series' visual artistry in both its set and puppetry design.







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# NSIDE / UNIT PLAN BRAINSTORM

### THE RAINBOW CONNECTION (ELA, SCIENCE)

In GRUG AND THE RAINBOW, Grug and his friends discover all the colors of the rainbow as they go on different adventures. Incorporate this spirit of exploration into your classroom with a rainbow week! Study the rainbow together as a class and explore a color a day for each day of the week. As you collect examples of the different colors with your class, write them down on a rainbow board or create a colorful collage! Have students bring in colorful objects from home for a show-and-tell, wear clothing reflecting the day's color theme, recount an adventure where they found a particular color or make colorful snacks to share with the whole class. Culminate with a rainbow celebration featuring food of each color explored, and for a final project make a rainbow oobleck\* out of water, cornstarch and food coloring. To support this unit, use the Creativity Page: *Searching for Colors with Detective Roy G. Biv!* in the **En Route** section.

### **GRUG COMES FROM A LAND DOWN UNDER** (ELA, GEOGRAPHY, SCIENCE)

Australia is home to many unique plants and animals that are not found anywhere else in the world! Introduce your students to some of Grug's friends, Snoot the echidna, Cara the carpet snake and others, by creating puppets of these animals. Additionally, ask your students to think of other Australian animals they might also include, such as wombats, kangaroos or koalas, and take some time together to learn about the characteristics, habitats and behaviors of these fascinating creatures! As an added bonus, have an animal dance party and encourage students to embody the movements of their new Aussie friends. To support this unit, use the Activity: *Do "The Grug"!* in the **Before** section.

### GRUG'S FRIENDLY CORNER (ELA, VISUAL ART, THEATER)

Imaginative set design is an important component of GRUG AND THE RAINBOW. Encourage your class to become scenic designers and storytellers to construct "Grug's Friendly Corner" or "Grug's Book Nook" right in your very own classroom! As a group, work together to make your own shady burrawang tree and a house fit for Grug, to set the stage for Grug's next adventure. This could be located in the library or other central area of your classroom. Encourage your students to recreate scenes they remember from the show, and use their Grug, or other animal finger puppets, to help bring fantastical stories to life! To support this unit, use the Creativity Page: *My Very Own Grug* in the **Before** section and/or the Creativity Page: *Grug's Next Big Adventure* in the **After** section.

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## BEFORE / ACTIVITY

### MAKE YOUR OWN FOUND-OBJECT MUSICAL INSTRUMENTS

Not only does Grug love adventure, he also loves to dance with his friends! Use this two-part activity to get your students moving and introduce them to musical instruments indigenous to Grug's home country—Australia!

Materials: Pebbles, sticks, paper towel rolls, tape, cardboard, paper cups

- **1.** Tell your students that they are going to create musical instruments inspired by traditional Australian instruments, using objects found in their classroom, around the school, at home or on the playground!
- **2**. Collect sticks and pebbles from outside and brainstorm ways to create sound using those objects. Aboriginal Australians often use resources found in their environment to create percussion instruments, like the rattle, skin drum or percussion sticks.
- **3**. Once you have made your own version of these instruments, experiment with the kinds of sounds and music they can make as a class.





## LEARN "THE GRUG"!

Not only does Grug love adventure, he also loves to dance with his friends! Use this two-part activity to get your students moving and introduce them to musical instruments indigenous to Grug's home—Australia!

### Use these steps to teach your students Grug's special dance:

- **1**. Have students stand with enough room to extend their arms and legs without touching a neighbor.
- 2. Model the steps of the dance for your students
  - a. Hands together
  - b. Right foot out
  - c. Feet together
  - d. Left foot out
  - e. Hug yourself and turn around
  - f. Shake your right leg
  - g. Shake your left leg
  - h. Jump and shout "I'm doing The Grug!"

- **3**. Ways to expand this activity include dancing in pairs or larger groups and/or incorporating additional movements suggested by your students.
- **4**. Combine "The Grug" with music played on your newly-made instruments and have a Grug dance party!

## TRIP GUIDE

Provide this resource to the School Trip Leader and all teachers/chaperones attending the performance.

### Before you leave school

We advise you to LEAVE ALL BAGS AND LUNCHES at school, if possible. If not, bags will be collected by New VICTORY staff and stored during the performance.

Plan to arrive at the NEW VICTORY venue at least 30–45 minutes before curtain time. The building opens one hour prior to curtain (i.e. 10am for an 11am performance). If you realize that your group is running late, please contact the theater DIRECTLY at **646.223.3020**. If you will be arriving by bus, please ensure that your driver drops your group off on the **north side** of 42<sup>nd</sup> Street between 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> Avenues.

### Arrival

When you reach 42<sup>nd</sup> Street, a member of the NEW VICTORY Front of House staff wearing a green vest will check in with the school trip leader.

If you arrive by bus, they will direct your bus to a location on the street where it is safest to unload the students.

It is important to wait until our staff checks in the School Trip Leader and Bus Driver before unloading the students.

They will record the bus number and give the School Trip Leader and the Bus Driver correlating tags.

<u>Please remember to have the School Trip</u> <u>Leader and the Bus Driver exchange cell</u> <u>numbers.</u>

The Front of House staff will give a time for the bus to return to pick up your school group.

### The question of lunch

NEW VICTORY venues are not equipped to host lunch/ snacks. In the early autumn and spring months, nearby Bryant Park (42<sup>nd</sup> Street at 6<sup>th</sup> Avenue) offers a pleasant place for lunching, and there are also public restroom facilities.

### Seating

In order to make your experience at the theater as efficient and safe as possible, you will not be issued tickets. Your group will be assigned seats in advance by the Education Department. Your seating assignment will not be available prior to the performance. If you have any questions, please contact the Education Department at: Education\_Tickets@NewVictory.org.

### Accessibility

Wheelchair seating must be requested in advance, at the time of the ticket request, and is subject to availability. Assisted listening devices are available for patrons who have hearing impairments.

### NEW 42ND STREET STUDIOS 229 West 42nd Street

### **BY SCHOOL BUS**

It is safest to drop off and pick up your school group on <u>the north side of the street</u> in front of the venue. Turn onto 42nd Street from 7th Avenue so students can unload in front of the theater space.



### During the show

42nd Street is extremely congested and has a high volume of traffic. According to the New York City Department of Transportation, vehicles are not allowed to sit idle or park on the street without special permission. Once your bus is empty, it is important that the bus driver find parking at a nearby location—see possible parking locations below.

If a driver chooses to park on 42nd Street, they do so at their own risk of being ticketed by the police. The New Victory Theater is not responsible for bus drivers who receive parking tickets.

### Possible parking locations

8th Avenue (both sides) between 38th and 39th Streets 11th Avenue (both sides) between 39th and 40th Streets

### Pick up

Taking Midtown traffic into consideration, bus drivers should leave their waiting location approximately 10 minutes prior to the return time given by the Front of House staff. Front of House staff will also help find a spot on 42nd Street to safely load your student group after the show has ended.

### **BY MTA. SUBWAY OR BUS**

### 1/2/3. N/R/Q/W/7

Exit the station at 42<sup>nd</sup> Street/7<sup>th</sup> Avenue. When you come out of the turnstile, take the stairs to your right. All New VICTORY venues are directly to the west of the subway station.

A/C/E to Port Authority Exit at 42<sup>nd</sup> Street/8<sup>th</sup> Avenue. Walk to 42<sup>nd</sup> Street, turn east, and continue walking until you arrive at New VICTORY venues.

### B/D/F/M

Exit at 42<sup>nd</sup> Street/6<sup>th</sup> Avenue. Walk west on 42<sup>nd</sup> Street until you come to 7<sup>th</sup> Avenue. The venues are on the north side of the street at 7<sup>th</sup> Avenue, next to the subway station.

The M10, M16, M27, M42, M104 buses all stop within one block of the venues.

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# AFTER / PERFORMANCE REFLECTION

Following your trip to The New Victory, you may find that your students want to discuss the performance and their opinions. Reflecting on the show and voicing an aesthetic response is an important part of the theater-going experience. Allowing your students the opportunity to articulate their own thoughts and hear the ideas of their classmates will increase the impact of the theater experience.

> Engage in a conversation with your students regarding their thoughts and feelings about the show. Use the following questions as prompts:

What were your favorite moments of the show?

What did you find surprising about GRUG AND THE RAINBOW's set?

What was the beginning, middle and end of the story?

How did the story make you feel?

What colors did Grug collect for his rainbow?

What do you think Grug's next adventure could be?
